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## DETECTIVES TO INSURE PRIVACY TO M'CORMICK

## Reporters Are Barred From Chicago Residence—Marriage Ceremony May Be Repeated.

Special to The New York Times. CHICAGO, Feb. 9.—Special interviewers who would inquire into the plans of Harold F. McCormick and his wife, Ganna Walska, are informed that henceforth they will not be received. A reporter calling at the McCormick mansion today was stopped by guards, who turned out to be four operatives especially engaged to keep newspaper men who would interview them away from the McCormick place while Mr. McCormick and his wife are in residence.

Mr. McCormick arrived today on the Twentieth Century Limited. He came accommpanied only by his valet, and it was said he had left his wife in New York to finish up some details concerning her American concert tour. Some reports stated that Mme. Walska would follow her husband to Chicago almost at once, others that she will not be seen here until shortly after her concert set for March 5.

Sol Hurok, manager of the Russian Grand Opera Company, the members of which arrived in Chicago on Wednesday, announced today that Mme. Ganna Walska probably will make several appearances with the Russians. He said she will probably appear as Philing in "Mignon," and in the title role in the "Snow Maiden."

The fact that Mr. McCormick brought several pieces of baggage bearing the name of his bride, gave rise to the theory that Mrs. McCormick might join him here soon. When she does arrive friends of the couple expect them to go through a second wedding ceremony to make their marriage legal in Illinois. Following the divorce obtained by Mrs. Rockefeller McCormick here, Mr. McCormick and Mms. Walska were married in Paris before the lapse of the year required ander Illinois law between a divorce and a marriage.
