John H. Carroll, general counsel of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, who is in charge of the Queen's itinerary after she leaves New York City. Queen Marie's decision in this regard is a wide departure from the customary practices not only of officials of the American Government, who are always accompanied, but also from that of most of prominent foreign visitors. No other explanation than that of privacy was forthcoming, nor could it be learned whether the Queen's contract to write exclusively for a private newspaper syndicate had influenced her in the matter.

When the Queen became the official guest of the United States upon her departure from New York and traveled to Washington on a special train provided by the American Government she was accompanied by representatives of four press associations. These same representatives, since the train will remain in Government control, will be permitted to return with her to New York tomorrow.

Queen Bars Press From Tour Train.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (P).—Newspaper correspondents and photographers will not accompany Queen Marie on the special train on which she will tour the country. This decision was reached when the Queen had expressed her desire to travel in privacy after her return to New York from the Capital late tomorrow.
