## CAROL AVOIDS PARIS.

Reporters Told He Will Stay Away
Till They Let Him Alone.

PARIS, Dec. 29 (P).—Prince Carol of Rumania will remain away from Paris until the newspaper men have made up their minds he is entitled to the privacy of a common individual. This was the information vouchsafed today at the villa in the Paris suburb of Neuilly, where as "Mr. Caraiman," the Prince has been living since the issuance of the decree, Jan. 4, 1926, depriving him of his dynastic rights. It was added that he had gone since Christmas eve and it was not known when he would return.

The house was dark and the French detectives who had been prominently watching the Rumanian Prince were not there. This was commented on as corroborating Carol's disappearance.

One report reaching Paris tonight was that Carol's confidential secretary was in Geneva trying to arrange for the Prince's return to Bucharest.
