

JUDGE KELLEY'S FUNERAL.

A QUIET CEREMONY OVER THE RE-
MAINS OF THE CONGRESSMAN.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 13.—The remains of the Hon. William D. Kelley, Pennsylvania's champion of protection, the "Father of the House," who so long and acceptably represented the Fourth District in Congress, were to-day consigned to the tomb. There was little show or display, privacy and quiet being insisted upon by the members of the dead man's family.

At the residence of Mrs. F. Oden Horstman, (the daughter of the deceased statesman,) 3,925 Chestnut-street, where the body lay, but few persons were admitted, and they were only the immediate relatives, a few close friends, and the Congressional committee appointed to attend the funeral. There were no services of any character at the residence. At 11:30 A. M. the casket was closed and borne to the hearse in waiting, and the little cortège proceeded to the First Unitarian Church, at Twenty-first and Chestnut streets, where services were conducted by the Rev. Dr. William H. Furness, Pastor Emeritus, and the Rev. Joseph May, the pastor of the church.

The church was crowded to the door, and among those present was almost the entire Pennsylvania Congressional delegation. Upon the conclusion of the services the funeral procession took up its journey to North Laurel Hill Cemetery. The interment took place shortly after 2 o'clock, and was devoid of formality, being witnessed only by the visiting Congressmen and the family and relatives of the deceased.
