Interred in Family Vault in Mount Vernon Cemetery.

ATCHISON, Kan., Aug. 19.—Funeral services over the body of ex-Senator John J. Ingalls were held this afternoon at Trinity Episcopal Church, and subsequently interment was made in the family vault in Mount Vernon Cemetery.
