

MISS MORGAN FLEES BEGGING BERLINERS

Banker's Daughter Deluged with
Appeals from City's Corpo-
rate Impecuniosity.

MOTORS OFF TO WIESBADEN

German Newspapers Had Advertised
Her as Soon to Have \$50,000,-
000 as Her Fortune.

BERLIN, July 18.—J. Pierpont Mor-
gan's daughter Anna was driven out of
Berlin this week by the annoying per-
sistency of German beggars and beg-
ging institutions. She had intended
spending four or five quiet days here
looking at picture galleries and mu-
seums, particularly some of the city's
sociological wonders, such as the model
workmen's dwellings, but when the
newspapers published the fact that she
was in town her repose and privacy
vanished.

Representatives of hospitals, orphan
asylums, institutions for the blind, homes
of various kinds, churches, and in fact
of every form of corporate impecunios-
ity the country contains deluged the
hotel Adlon, where Miss Morgan and
her friend, Miss Elizabeth Marbury,
were staying, with personal calls, let-
ters, telegrams, and subscription lists.

The New York heiress, whose troubles
are principally due to the statement
in a morning paper that she will soon
be the possessor of a fortune of be-
tween \$50,000,000 and \$62,500,000, con-
sidered the sudden increase in the size
of her mail a joke for a few hours, but
as the thing showed indications of
becoming a monstrous nuisance, she
made up her mind to leave Berlin
within two hours, and as soon as her
maids could pack her trunks and her
chauffeur could clear her big touring
car for action she was on her way to
Wiesbaden.

If the daughter of the American
Croesus had stayed here a day or two
longer she might confidently have
hoped for at least a dozen proposals
from aristocratic but indigent military
men.
